

Instrumental Update Ukulele Summer





FOCUS OF THE WEEK - THE THREE CHORD TRICK!!!!!!!!

So many of our favourite tunes use just three chords: Chord I, IV and V. We often refer to this as the 'three-chord trick'. How many songs do you know that use these chords?



Always start your practice by learning your chord changes as a warm up. Check that you are sitting properly and strumming the way your teacher has shown you.

Use this worksheet to discover how to build chords in a major key and put the theory into practice by learning **Happy Birthday** in different keys using the 3 chord-trick in C, G, D major and F major too!

Those who prefer chords - you will need to play in Waltz time. Count three beats in a bar.

Oom-pah-pah | Oom-pah-pah etc... The strong beat is on beat 1.

Try the chords. Notice that it uses the three-chord trick in F
